Speaking from the Hart

Getting Beaten Up, Following Jesus, and becoming little Christs

I just received an e-mail from a friend who is getting beaten up by the church. Her story is when young, she grew up on the wrong side of the tracks, and at school during recess she found herself often beaten up because she was different than everyone else. Somehow, amazingly and by the grace of God, 'grace' found her. She has gone on to have an impactful life and ministry.

The trouble is she is getting beaten up again, because some (i.e. a few in her flock) think she is living on the wrong side of the tracks, theologically that is. She is as orthodox as they come, but for those believe that on this side of heaven, in order to get into heaven, we need to adhere to 'their' particular 21st century version of the law, as 'they' and 'their' group understand and define it. They wouldn't say it that way, but I believe in practice that is what they are doing.

That kind of thinking is not new. In Jesus' day the Jewish tradition had around 613 commandments that a person, in order to be a good Jew, must follow. As Presbyterians, as a confessional church, we are far from those who say anything goes. In our ordination vows ([click here for link – see page 3](#)) we commit to certain basic affirmation and essential tenants, as does she.

But as the world gets messier, there is something in our human nature that sometimes wants everything spelled out, no greys, no ambiguities, no debating. "Here it is.... here is the TRUTH, or our modern version of the Old Testaments 613 commandments." If someone in the church thinks differently, but still loves Jesus, we make a judgment that they must be following a different Jesus, or not really following Jesus; so we dismiss them, or beat them up - which in the church we can do in such a kind, but hurtful way.

Meanwhile, the world God so loves continues to break; and every night on the evening news we see it.

I do not presume, but I sometimes wonder: whether it is the world's self-inflicted suffering, pain, and evil or the church's misplaced priorities and values, self-absorption and pride that must break the heart of God more. Every church split since the reformation has captivated the energy and passion of all those involved. They (we) get so caught up in the fight, and emotions run high. Those involved in the church fight and theological debate can justify what we are doing and thinking – I know I can and have. But seriously – 41,000 Protestant denominations later (i.e. that's how many there are today) – who got it right? How many new denominations and splits do we need in order to finally fulfil Christ's mission to the world. How many denominational nuances do we need to fulfill the Great Commandment to love God and neighbor as self?

Well, I think our PCUSA ordination vows got it right... because first and foremost... as followers of Jesus we affirm at the center of our faith that: Jesus is Lord, and before anything else, Jesus is the way, the TRUTH and the life.

As Christians, our name says it all ... CHRISTians, or as CS Lewis said, each of us when baptized are to become 'little Christs – for the sake of the world.



*This is the whole of Christianity. There is nothing else. It is so easy to get muddled about that. It is easy to think that the Church has a lot of different objects—education, building, missions, holding services. Just as it is easy to think the State has a lot of different objects—military, political, economic, and what not. But in a way things are much simpler than that. The State exists simply to promote and to protect the ordinary happiness of human beings in this life. A husband and wife chatting over a fire, a couple of friends having a game of darts in a pub, a man reading a book in his own room or digging in his own garden— that is what the State is there for. And unless they are helping to increase and prolong and protect such moments, all the laws, parliaments, armies, courts, police, economics, etc., are simply a waste of time. In the same way the Church exists for nothing else but to draw men into Christ, to make them little Christs. If they are not doing that, all the cathedrals, clergy, missions, sermons, even the Bible itself, are simply a waste of time. God became Man for no other purpose. C.S. Lewis, *Mere Christianity* (1952; Harper Collins: 2001) 199.*
