Highlights of Worship and Dr. Kim Long's Presentation

Dr. Kimberley Long, Associate Professor of Worship at Columbia Seminary, led us in a time of reflection and worship around the theme: *Living Wet: What difference does it make to be baptized? What difference does it make to go through life "walking wet?"* Kim spoke of baptism as: A Gift, A Call (our first ordination to ministry), and Promised Hope for the World. Using some wonderful stories and helpful images, Kim addressed the question: How does our baptism shape our life of discipleship?

Some quotes from her presentation:

- Baptism is not a singular event, it is an entire way of life, a life-long journey that is only complete in our death.
- Baptism is the gift we receive that shapes us for the story we are to live.
- We are called to live in light of the coming Kingdom of God; so the world looks like God intended it to ... so we wait, watch, and are ready, day by day as baptized Christians, living wet, to live that out now.

In the article "Clean Sweep", featured in "The Fly on the Wall," a woman sweeping the steps of Idlewild Presbyterian Church was highlighted, along with the fact that she was wearing no clothes.

I will explain it quite simply: mental illness, alcoholism, homelessness. And she has a name. Her name is Marilyn.

At Idlewild, we have loved her, fed her, counseled with her, tried to refer her for some help, cautioned her, and have even had to use "tough love" at times. For we dare to believe that beneath all that brokenness is a beloved child of God.

It was disheartening, even shameful at times, to hear the ridicule and the laughter that this evoked, for it is not funny. The homeless and the mentally ill are the lepers of our day, and they are ignored at best, scapegoated, and abused by a narcissistic culture at worst.

Jesus was as clear as day toward the end of his life when he told a parable about what was truly important. "When did we see you hungry ... or naked?" Today I hear him asking: "When did we see you mentally ill and homeless? As you did it unto the least of these, our brothers and sisters, you did it to me."

For we are all broken in one way or the other. Some are able, with our privilege, to hide it better than others.

As a presbytery we were blessed by Kim's presence and presentation; and Kim was delighted that her mother, who recently moved to Englewood was able to come to the meeting and hear her daughter.

Summary of the Presbytery Meeting and Business

At the meeting:

We were grateful for the wonderful hospitality of the Northminster Church;

In worship, we were invited to remember our baptisms, Communion was celebrated, the word was preached, and the Northminster choirs and music lifted our hearts and spirit;

Presentations were given by Beth El, Cedar Kirk, Westminster Presbyterian Homes, Florida Presbyterian Disaster Assistance Network, and Mision Peniel;

On a sad note, it was announced that Rev. Dr. Don Harris, Vice President of Church Relations for Westminster Homes, died that morning after a relatively short illness;





We received the Stated Clerk's Report, and voted on an Omnibus Motion that included a report from the Nominations and Representation Committee;

We heard a summary of how the Presbytery's 2013 reorganization plan, and vision and values have affected and shaped the life of the Presbytery in the past 3 years;

We commissioned the 2016 Commissioners for the 222nd General Assembly (Teaching Elders - Hmingi Brown, Chris Carlson, India Dennis, and Ruling Elders - Claudia George, Jerry Fox, Lil Rea);

We voted on changes in the Standing Rules affecting the Steering Committee's voting members, as well as adding Mision Peniel as a standing team of the Steering Committee.;

We heard an update on the Church Redevelopment Fund, which is tentatively being called the *Church and Community Blessing Grants Initiative*;

We received the report from Clint Cottrell and Winston Lawson on our recent Cuba trip and possible partnership with one of the presbyteries of the IPCR (our sister church) in Cuba;

We received as a Candidate under care: Lynne Peters from Venice Presbyterian, who is attending Dubuque Seminary's distant learning program, and received Christian Faux of First, Bonita Springs, and Jordan Goodwin of Church of the Palms as Inquirers;

We welcomed Kevin Morris as Pastor of Hope United;

We approved the call of Faith, Cape Coral to Elizabeth Kuehl as Associate Pastor;

We approved the Terms of Call for 2016 for all teaching elders serving congregations;

WE heard a report on the changes coming from the Board of Pensions related to the Pension and Health Care benefits affecting church staffs (more options are being giving rather than one size fits all);



A first draft of an Adaptive (flexible) Model for Pastoral Transitions was shared;

We approved the relocation of Whitfield Estates Presbyterian Church, and their name change, better suited for their new location, to *Oak Pointe Church* (it was noted that on the sign and church information there will be the PCUSA logo as well as "Oak Point is a member congregation of the PCUSA");

The topic for the regional gatherings was announced (i.e. how we are growing, making, and equipping disciples in our congregations – sharing stories, examples and best practices);

Preliminary details were presented for the 25th Anniversary Celebration of Peace River Presbytery on November 10, 2016;

Alan Penick, Treasurer of Peace River, reviewed PRP finances, and commented on how the *Three Streams* funding design is working;

We were grateful for Moderator Lil Rea's leadership of the meeting;

and we were dismissed, to meet again in the late summer regional gatherings and the November 10th Presbytery Meeting.

Deeper look at 3 issues

Mision Peniel - The work of Mision Peniel has captured the imaginations and hearts of the congregations in Peace River since its inception. The work there is vital, and we have been well served by the Mision Peniel Task Force which, since Peace River assumed responsibility for Mision Peniel in 2012, has given oversight to this work.

The original vision was to create Mision Peniel as a separate 501c3 non-profit corporation, like Beth El and Cedarkirk, who are Covenant Partners, but are separate from the Presbytery. The Steering Committee, upon the recommendation of the Mision Peniel Task Force, brought forward a recommendation that Mision Peniel function directly as a ministry of Peace River and the Standing Rules be changed accordingly. This relationship could be changed in the future, but strategically, at this point, the Task Force and Steering Committee believe this is the best next step. The Presbytery concurred.

The Committee on Ministry introduced what is being called: **An Adaptive Approach to Church Leadership and Pastoral Transitions**. In this time of rapid cultural, spiritual, and economic change, when congregational vulnerabilities get easily accentuated (especially in times of transition), is there another model for dealing with pastoral transitions that will help Peace River Presbytery better serve our congregations? Is there a way to accept that transitions are a part of life, and healthy pastors and congregations have ways to deal with them? The Committee on Ministry has spent the past two years in conversations around these topics, and introduced what they are calling “clinical trials,” or experiments, to see if there may be some better ways to face pastoral transitions.

New Location and Name for Whitfield Estates Presbyterian Church – Whitfield Estates was established just north of the Sarasota-Bradenton airport and developed as the first drive-in church in the country in the early 50's. Robert Schuller came to visit it prior to his beginning his ministry in California. At one point 500-1000 cars were parked in an 8 acre, grassy lot behind a sanctuary designed to incorporate the worshipers in cars, by having a large 20' by 60' glass window facing the parking lot. Times have changed, and the building has become an albatross to this congregation, too costly to maintain, and not suited for present ministry needs. The Trustees of the Presbytery gave Whitfield Estates permission to sell their existing building, and seek a new facility. We are thrilled for them that their building has sold, and they have purchased a new facility that is located in the center of their ministry area, and will be much more suited to their current ministry focus and needs. Their new site is ½ mile north of their present location, next to Presbyterian Villas, just off Tamiami Trail. Their new name is Oak Pointe Church.

God is at work! Good things are happening in our congregations and presbytery. Challenges are being named and faced. The question before us - as always - is: How is God calling, inviting, and sending us to work with God in what God is already doing?

To that end I am grateful to be on this journey with you!
