Weekly Presbytery Letter ~ June 1, 2017

Rev. Dr. Doug Pratt, 2017 Presbytery Moderator

Dear Ministers, Elders and Churches of Peace River,

I have now nearly reached the halfway mark of my year serving as your Moderator. Thank you for the privilege you've given me of serving in this way—it is a first for me, although I've been an ordained PCUSA pastor for 38 years. I am proud of our Presbytery. It is a body marked by strong collegiality and mutual respect, committed to living out our values and enabling the leadership of our congregations to pursue excellence in our service to the Lord and our communities.

I have begun my 14th year as one of the pastors in Bonita Springs. (How time flies when you're having fun and living in such a near-paradise!) I believe that my primary service to Peace River is in trying to effectively lead one of our congregations. There is no question that church ministry in Southwest Florida is unique. We face some unusual challenges, but we also have some unusual opportunities.

The conventional wisdom within the American church for many years has been that the first two decades of life are our great window of opportunity to reach people and bring them to personal faith. And if that faith is not firmly rooted in young people by the time they move into their early 20's, our chance of molding them into faithful followers of Christ diminishes dramatically.

I have become convinced from my ministry experiences here in Florida that the conventional wisdom is being altered before our eyes. I believe that a second great window of opportunity to reach many people for Christ is emerging in their final two or three decades of life. I have been privileged to witness and participate in many people in our community coming to the Lord, or returning to the Lord. We are seeing a significant harvest. Some were raised in a church environment, and some were not. But at this time in their lives there is an enhanced openness to spiritual things.

Why is this new window of opportunity opening? (1) Partly it is due to our enhanced longevity and health. When Social Security was established during the Depression (and the average age of retirement was set at 65), most people only had a few years to live. Today, through advancements in medicine and nutrition and healthy lifestyles, our final decades of post-retirement life are much longer and fuller. (2) With the empty-nest and retirement seasons in life, people discover that they have more time and opportunity to engage in spiritual things (and in volunteer activities) than they had when their schedules were dominated by family responsibilities. (3) Those who have the freedom to relocate to a place like Florida (either seasonally or full-time) are typically open to forming new relationships and embracing new opportunities. If a neighbor or friend invites them to come to church, there is a greater possibility that they will try it.

I have many friends and church members who would acknowledge that they put God and spiritual concerns "on the shelf" for a while, as they focused on raising their families and building their careers. But now they have the time and the opportunity to address those neglected aspects of who they are (as made in the image of God and with the "God-shaped vacuum" that lies inside each of us). There is a deep hunger among many: to learn the Bible (perhaps reading it for the first time); to give back in meaningful service; to learn how to pray; and to build friendships with other adults based not on a common work environment or children's school activities but on common interests, beliefs and values.

We are in an exciting time and place to be serving the Lord and leading His church here in Southwest Florida. As Baby Boomers transition to new chapters in their lives and relocate to our area, truly “the fields are white for the harvest.”

May this summer be a refreshing and renewing time for each of you and your congregations.
