Connections ... Connecting ... Connectional is Who We Are (plus some coming events and important links)

What is distinctive about our Presbyterian theology and polity is that we intentionally seek to connect with one another. Our decisions are not made in isolation, nor are they made by singular individuals, (i.e. pastors for a congregation or bishops for a presbytery), but always in a context of a council, whether the council be a session, presbytery, Synod or General Assembly.

Why? In the words of Jesus: And when two or three of you are together because of me, you can be sure that I'll be there." (Matthew 18:20 – the Message).

Why? We are an ecclesiastical version of the classic spiritual:

...Back bone connected to the shoulder bone Shoulder bone connected to the neck bone Neck bone connected to the head bone Now hear the word of the Lord.

As the Body of Christ, Presbyterians - since the days of John Calvin in Geneva and the early Presbyterians who gathered in Philadelphia for the first Presbytery meeting in the early 1700's - know our "better selves" emerge when we connect with one another. However, making, maintaining and nurturing connections is not always easy nor do we always get it right; never-the-less we keep at it. So how and when are we making those connections in Peace River?

Connections are made formally, as in a presbytery meeting.

And we thank First Arcadia for hosting our recent meeting on May 18th. I was interested in reading a column that one of the elder commissioners to the Presbytery wrote for the summer newsletter of Trinity Presbyterian Church of Venice:

What in The World Is Presbytery & What's So Great About It?

Peace River Presbytery (PRP) is our local, regional group of Presbyterian Church (USA) congregations in SW Florida. PRP starts up in Palmetto and reaches down to Naples. In our "connectional" system they meet quarterly to act on matters vital important to the various churches.

Most recently, PRP met on May 18th in Arcadia. They did some serious business, like welcoming three new pastors, and forming an Administrative Commission to come along side (and support) a ... pastor and congregation. PRP shared in Bible Study with an extended tutorial on the biblical principles regarding REFORMED worship.

Bob Speier: "The time spent in Bible Study and Worship. I it found very meaningful."

Bob Elliot: "Different from other presbyteries I've been to and it may sound strange...but it was FUN."

Connections happen informally through gatherings of pastors or congregations working together in their community. This spring and summer, members of the Presbytery's Congregational Vitality Team are hosting five regional gathering for pastors just to talk, be of support to one another, and share how God is at work in each of their lives as well as in the churches they serve.

Connections happen through the sharing of resources. A hope and goal of the <u>Blessing Grants</u>, approved at the May 18th meeting, is that these grants will spark the imaginations of every session to engage in some new ministry or at least begin thinking about doing ministry in some new ways.

Summary of the Blessing Grants - Peace River Presbytery will establish a permanent invested corpus, the earnings from which will be given as grants to congregations and presbytery entities who propose to:


Support church development, redevelopment, and/or transformation:

- By initiating, altering or expanding outreach ministries in their local communities or;
- By creating PCUSA new church developments or worshipping communities.

This fund will be replenished using earnings from the invested corpus and any gifts designated for this purpose from organizations or individuals.

Connections happen with the larger church.

The Synod of the South Atlantic has just called a new Synod Leader, the Rev. Joyce Liberman, formerly the Associate Stated Clerk for the Office of General Assembly. Joyce will be a great addition to the Synod and a support to the 17 presbyteries of which Peace River is one. <u>Click here to read Joyce's biography</u>.






Connections happen by being a learning community, which is one of our Presbytery's core values. To help congregations of similar size have the best opportunity to learn from each other, as well as hear some best practices and theory unique to their culture and size, on September 12 and 13, we will continue with our late summer presbytery gatherings.

- On September 12 at Wintergarden Presbyterian Church, our smaller membership churches will gather with Robert Hay of the Presbyterian Foundation to look at stewardship practices best suited for the smaller church.
- On September 13 at First, Port Charlotte, medium and larger churches will gather for conversation, mutual learning, as Robert shares best practices and ideas suited for these churches. More details to follow, but mark your calendars.

Also, **September 25-27**, one of the best nationally recognized Stewardship Workshops called <u>Stewardship Kaleidoscope</u> (<u>click here</u>) will be in our back yard. And we connect with the General Assembly in many ways, one of which is sharing in the support of mission co-workers like <u>Dan and Elizabeth Turk (click here)</u> in Madagascar and <u>Drs. Cindy and Les Morgan (click here)</u> in Bangladesh. Also, the Presbyterian Cuba Partnership Network and mission co-worker <u>Jo Ella Holman (click here)</u>, mission co-worker for the Caribbean and Cuba, has been supporting us as a presbytery as we develop the relationship with Matanzas Presbytery.

Just as the knee bone is connected the thigh bone, and the thigh bone is connected to the hip bone ... so a session is connected to a presbytery, and presbytery connected to a synod and a General Assembly. For better and for worse we are connectional church. No Presbyterian pastor can be a lone ranger, nor do congregations exists in isolation and independent from the other congregations within a given region/presbytery.

Can we do better? Always! Are we connecting in some meaningful and important ways? I believe so.

As always would love to hear your thoughts, and I encourage sessions to have a conversation about what it means for your congregation to be part of this connectional "Body" called Peace River Presbytery.

the sinew that connects...

the common missions shared...

and the mutual support and accountability that is at the heart of who we are as Presbyterians.
